The goal of our new Newsletter is to reconnect all of the amazing Silent Witness projects and exhibits around the globe, and to learn more about the work you're doing in your own community - and then to share it with others. First, let me catch you up on what's been going on with the Silent Witness Board of Directors. In 2006, the current Board of Directors was created after the resignation of Executive Director (ED), Janet Hagberg. As one of the founders of Silent Witness (SW) in 1990, Janet maintained the organization as the ED until her retirement in 2006. Janet's energy and passion for SW throughout her years of involvement was the driving force that kept SW vitally committed to the original mission to end domestic violence (DV) murders through awareness and education. The connections made by Janet throughout the United States and Canada were valuable relationships that brought people and their passions together.

In her preparation to leave the Board, Janet selected a new Board of Directors to carry the mission and vision forward and find a strategy that would keep SW involved in healing domestic violence in our society.

From 2006 - 2012, the Board struggled to find its momentum and regain connections with the SW projects in the USA, Canada and abroad, but we continued to reach out as best we could and get information to people as needed - but it's been a struggle. After a long discussion in the summer of 2013, it was decided that we would make the commitment to begin a campaign to reignite the Silent Witness Initiative and it's important work.

In October 2013 the Board voted to hire Annie Sarver-Bodoh, a consultant with Advancement Advisors in St. Paul, MN to assist the Board in developing a strategy for creating the next phase of the SW organization. Annie came to us with twenty-seven years of experience working in the non-profit sector in St. Paul. Annie's leadership skills, experience and motivation have added renewed strength to the Board.

The synergy and goodwill of each Board member contributes to an integrated approach to improving the media presence through the website, newsletter, blog, facebook and linkedin, in addition to obtaining current DV statistics, updating the contact information for the network of SW projects and in the future locating other successful organizations that are doing DV education and prevention work.

We are pleased to showcase the new Newsletter, website and media presence this month. A grateful thank you to Annie Sarver-Bodoh, Jennifer Stanley, Co-Chair, Board members Nancy Rafi, Fay Choban, Renee Falcum-Youngberg, Leslie Monaghan, and Karen Hartz, Treasurer.

## International Silent Witness Update

### What's been happening in Canada?

The New Brunswick Silent Witness Project ([www.silentwitness.ca](http://www.silentwitness.ca)), inspired by Maine's project (Susan Fuller and Wayland Linscott) was officially launched in November 2002. We have created a Guide to encourage and support other provinces in establishing their own projects, and to date, we are thrilled that almost all Canadian provinces have Silent Witness exhibits. The project also inspired the creation of the ballet "Ghosts of Violence" ([www.ghostsofviolence.ca](http://www.ghostsofviolence.ca)), which held its world premiere in 2011. The New Brunswick Witnesses travel to a different community each month to take part in education and awareness events in the province.

## Sheila's Shawls and Paul's Scarves

### The healing power of a shawl or scarf for those left behind



Our Silent Witness project in memory of the late Minnesota Senator Paul Wellstone and his wife Sheila has really swept the country. The Sheila's Shawls and Paul's Scarves projects began in 2002, and as of February 2014 we have provided shawls and scarves to over 6000 families and friends of our Silent Witness figures.

Thirty or so women across the nation continue to knit prayers of safety and comfort into scarves and shawls for family members and victims of domestic violence.

Sheila's Shawls and Paul's Scarves has been operating under The Silent Witness Initiative since 2002. We knit because there is a need. We knit because we care. Everyone needs to know that they have love and support. The group started from the grassroots of the Silent Witness Initiative in Minnesota and then spread across the nation, the continent, and the world. We have shawls that are made or sent to Canada, Malaysia, Europe, and Africa. We started locally, moved to the Yahoo groups and when Ravelry started it's knitting groups we moved there. You can also find us on Facebook. We work in small groups or individually, connecting wirelessly around the world and sharing pictures and mailing our bundles of comfort to other states and shelters throughout the world.

As of March 2014 we have donated 6074 items.
